

I first got into archaeology at the age of 18 when I attended the University of Pavia, Italy and joined the NVAT when I started to work as the HER Officer and, later, City Archaeologist, for the Archeology Services in Peterborough in 2007.

My top three experiences/highlights in archeology have been the completion of my PhD at Sheffield University, my appointment as City Arcaheologist in 2010, and the discovery of the Roman villa near Itter Park (Walton), with associated community projects.

I, along with Andrew Hatton, undertook an excavation recording in 1998 during maintenance work along the western edge of the northbound carriageway of the A1. At least 57 burials representing a portion of a late Romano-British cemetery outside the southwest gate of the Roman town of *Durobrivae* were recorded. Pre-dating the cemetery were parallel ditches indicating rural activity (livestock management) during the mid to late 3rd century. Towards the end of the 3rd century the land was used for burial.
